DOREEN PHILLIPS

We were sorry to hear of the death of Doreen Phillips, who attended our Open Days for many years, making many friends and enjoying our activities.

Born at Caversham, near Reading, in 1931, she moved with her family to Oxford aged three and later attended Donnington School and Cowley St John Girls' School.

She and her future husband John liked to dance, a tricky feat as John was 6ft 4in tall and Doreen was 5ft 4in.

They married during the bitter winter of 1962 - the doors to St Albans Church had to be defrosted before they could get in and it was too cold to go on honeymoon.

Doreen worked as a donor attendant for the Blood Transfusion Service before moving to the public health department as a shorthand typist. She was also part of the polio vaccination team.

She left in 1967 to have her only son John. According to her



family, she was "a traditional homemaker and Mum, who enjoyed sewing, crafting and fixing things, typical of the 'make do and mend' generation".

She later worked at a nearby school for 14 years, "doing a bit of everything", before being diagnosed with MS in 1994.

She was a big animal lover and (Continued on next page)

kept cats for many years. Budgies were also a favourite – she enjoyed teaching them to talk.

Doreen moved from Oxford to Didcot in 2008 to be nearer her son, but by the first Covid lockdown in 2020, she started to deteriorate.

After a move to a nursing home, her health improved, she moved about on her motorised wheelchair, enjoyed reading, TV and puzzle books – and tucked into her daily dose of dark chocolate. She died at the home in March after a spell in hospital.

Members of our group attended the funeral at South Oxfordshire Crematorium to pay tribute to Doreen. We, like her family, will miss her.

VITAL ROLE

The MS Society has released figures which show how much it relies on volunteers to main its services.

It reports: "We have 2,907 volunteers supporting the MS community across the UK, 389 new volunteers joined in 2022 and the average age of volunteers is 42." There are 237 active local MS groups, 83 per cent of which have a group co-ordinator, 96 per cent have a finance volunteer and 170 groups are delivering an MS support service.

The society's chief executive, Nick Moberly, praised the role volunteers had played during the Covid pandemic and other crises.

He said: "The uncertainty caused by the ongoing conflict across the world, and now the cost-of-living crisis, is having a particularly significant impact on those living with MS in our community.

"Despite this, we've continued to see the dedication and support of our volunteers in action throughout all parts of our organisation."

The society has now introduced impact awards to recognise and celebrate the contribution of volunteers. The first 101 awards were presented to recipients last October.
